GROWTH GROUPS

There are three reasons for making the development of these study books a priority at Cloverdale Baptist Church:

1. We want to prioritize the hearing and applying of God's Word.

This is essential for the authentication of who God's people are (Matthew 7:21-28); and our growth into being who God wants us to be (Psalm 138:2; James 1:22-25). It is our prayer and desire that this book helps you to focus on what God's Word is saying, and that it helps to lead you into applying His Word to everyday life.

2. We value small group ministry.

It is our belief that small group ministry can produce passion in God's people (Hebrews 10:25), and serve as a protection for God's people (Hebrews 3:12-14). If you are not in a small group we encourage you to join one, and until you do, to use the questions part of this notebook not only for reflection, but to interact with your family and/or friends in a way that is actively seeking to apply the Bible to your life (Deuteronomy 6:1-9).

May our God use this book through the power of His Spirit to bring change in His people for His glory.

OVERVIEW

Perhaps no other letter in the history of the world has had such a tremendous impact as the book of Romans.

John MacArthur states, "Most, if not all, of the great revivals and reformations in the history of the church have been directly related to the book of Romans...It's commonly agreed that the Epistle to the Romans is one of the greatest Christian writings. It is power has been demonstrated again and again at critical points in the history of the church."

As I long for revival in my own life and in this church, Romans is one of the most powerful places to go to produce it in us.

Romans is written somewhere between 56-58 A.D.; Paul is in Corinth on his third missionary journey and longing to be a part of what is going on in the Roman church. The book is about life change as an overflow of experiencing the Gospel (1:5, 16-17). It draws us closer to God so we can without shame draw others in the same direction.

It is not a systematic theology, and yet the theology in the book of Romans is overwhelmingly rich, with each part adding to the whole and leaving every Spiritfilled believer overwhelmed with God's love. Romans is a book that changes the world by changing people. So, as we prayerfully engage in this journey together, may we offer ourselves afresh to God, to the impact of His Gospel, and the glory of the message of this letter.

Oh that we would be revived in our passion and first love for God as we experience His love!

KEY WORDS & CONCEPTS IN ROMANS¹

Condemnation: This is a word used in Romans to show God's right view of sinful humanity in their guilt before Him. It is what He views us as (condemned) in showing what we rightly deserve because of our sin and is the opposite of justification.

Faith: Hebrews 11:1, 6 describes it as being certain of what we hope for and certain of what we cannot see. It is also something that allows us to please God, and without it, it becomes impossible to please God. Perhaps simply understood, it is "the unqualified acceptance of and dependence on the completed work of Jesus Christ to secure God's mercy toward believers (Swindoll)". It is all of grace (Ephesians 2:1-10) and is essential for salvation and sanctification.

Flesh: As used in theology, it describes the identity of humans who are not saved by grace through faith and the orientation that believers battle after being saved. Those who belong to Jesus battle the flesh, the world, and the devil. The battle against the flesh is a battle against habits and patterns of thinking that are in opposition to God and are ultimately self-centred.

Glorification: This is the end of salvation. It will be the reality that all who die in Christ receive, most fully, when Jesus returns for His church. This will include an absolute freedom from sin and its consequences and a beauty in conformity to Christ in incorruptible perfect bodies that will last for all eternity in the presence of God.

Gospel: The word Gospel simply means "good news". When Christians use this term, they mean the good news about Jesus Christ.

This includes the Holiness of God and His demand for perfection and the fallenness of humans and their sin that falls short of God's glory; the wonder of life, death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus and the call to respond to this grace by faith in Jesus alone.

The Gospel is, broadly speaking, the entire Bible, but simply it is focused on Jesus and the cross.

A good summary of the Gospel from 9 Marks is:

1. God. God is the creator of all things (Gen. 1:1). He is perfectly holy, worthy of all worship, and will punish sin (1 John 1:5, Rev. 4:11, Rom. 2:5-8).

2. Man. All people, though created good, have become sinful by nature (Gen.1:26-28, Ps. 51:5, Rom. 3:23). From birth, all people are alienated from God, hostile to God, and subject to the wrath of God (Eph. 2:1-3).

3. Christ. Jesus Christ, who is fully God and fully man, lived a sinless life, died on the cross to bear God's wrath in the place of all who would believe in him, and rose from the grave in order to give his people eternal life (John 1:1, 1 Tim. 2:5, Heb. 7:26, Rom. 3:21-26, 2 Cor. 5:21, 1 Cor. 15:20-22).

4. Response. God calls everyone everywhere to repent of their sins and trust in Christ in order to be saved (Mark 1:15, Acts 20:21, Rom. 10:9-10).

Grace: God's unmerited favour given to sinners who deserve His wrath and from Him receive good. Being saved by grace includes the reality that there is nothing in humans that could earn or cause them to deserve being saved, but God who is rich in grace chooses in that grace to save those who deserve wrath. Sometimes an acrostic for this has been used: "God's Riches At Christ's Expense". It is good but leaves out the underserved nature of this. Instead of receiving God's wrath and judgment, which all humans deserve, those who experience saving grace receive His love and blessing. Salvation is *all of grace*.

Justification: This is a precious word that some have defined as "the declared reality for Christians that we are righteous — just as if I had never sinned", and that is helpful, but awesomely it is more; it includes "just as if I had always obeyed". Swindoll helpfully defines it like this, "God's declaration or pronouncement that sinners, upon believing in Christ, are righteous because of Christ—even though still in a sinning state." Those who believe are declared righteous.


Propitiation: This is the satisfaction of God's wrath against sin through the shed blood of Jesus on the cross. For Christians it is the reality that God's wrath that is rightly being poured out against sin and sinners has been satisfied on their behalf by Jesus (2 Corinthians 5:21).

Regeneration: This word refers to rebirth, or being born again. Humans are born in sin, and are dead in their trespasses and sin. Spiritual birth results in regeneration and changes who the believer is. Christ is formed in their hearts, and they are made partakers in the divine nature (2 Corinthians 5:17).

Sanctification: The basic meaning of "sanctify", is to be set apart. As this word is used, it is the pursuit of becoming who we are, or the pursuit of holiness. It is the process by which Christians move towards practical holiness. It is the growth process towards being like Jesus (Romans 8:29). God's Spirit works in His followers to will and to act as they discipline their lives for holiness.

Sin: Sin is anything that falls short of God's glory. It means to have missed the mark, and humans are sinful by nature, nurture, and choice. The condition that sin places humans under is called slavery, and freedom can only be found in Christ. It is a transgression of God's holy law and includes action and passivity. It places humans under God's righteous holy judgment as those born in sin who are slaves to sin and continue to sin.

Sovereignty: What does it mean that God is sovereign? It means that God is *all powerful, all knowing*, and *all wise* and is working everything out in conformity to the purpose of His Will (Ephesians 1:11). He is over all things and is the *sovereign ruler*.

Romans 1:1–17

The book of Romans is one of the most important books that has ever been written. MacArthur states, "Most, if not all of the great revivals and reformations in the history of the church have been directly related to the book of Romans". It is a book that followers of Jesus cherish because of its richness in theology and the way it can be worked out in everyday life. It is a book about the way the Gospel can become the centre of the life of the follower or the believer, or more simply, it displays to followers of Jesus what Gospel-centred living looks like. This book is worth spending time getting to know, for through it we will meet the God of the Bible, see His Gospel plan more fully, and allow this plan to infiltrate and dominate our lives.

I am not ashamed of the Gospel! Oh that we will come together to know and live this rich gift from God to us!

PRAYER

PHILIPPIANS 4:4-7

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice. ⁵ Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; ⁶ do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. ⁷ And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

REJOICE IN THE LORD

Start your prayer time with a focus on God and praising Him. In Him, no matter what is happening in the world, we can find joy. As you rejoice in Him, focus on who He is, and praise Him for the attributes that He brings to your mind.

REST IN THE LORD

"Do not be anxious" This is a command. As we pray to the LORD, we know He is sovereign, good, and loving, so we can rest in Him completely. Take the time to declare your dependence and trust on Him, and where you find your heart anxious, confess that and ask for peace.

THANKSGIVING

Spend time in thanksgiving. This is so important to us in our prayers both as a reminder and also in obedience to His command to be thankful (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18). Seek to be thankful in all of your prayers, and if you feel there is not much to be thankful for, focus on the Gospel.


SUPPLICATION

THE ROADS TO DESTRUCTION

Romans 1:18-32

To understand the Gospel one must understand that it is the good news of salvation. Key to this understanding and depth of experience is understanding and experiencing what we are saved from. Romans 1:18-32 is one of the key passages in the Bible in helping us to grow in our grasp of what it means to be under God's wrath, and in pointing us to the reality of finding our exclusive hope in Jesus and the cross. This passage is one that focuses on Gentiles or those who do not have Biblical knowledge of God, and yet it shows clearly why all humans are without excuse and helps us to see the pathway to destruction so that we can avoid it!

This is a passage that shows us that what displeases God is when He is not acknowledged as God, honored, or thanked. Therefore authentic believers who experience God's amazing grace and the salvation that comes from the wrath of God will acknowledge Him as God, glorify Him in all they say and do, and spend their time thanking Him.

Spend time privately as individuals (in your minds) confessing your sins to God and longing for purity. (Read together 1 John 1:9 to close this time in prayer).



CANADA, IT IS WORSE THAN YOU THINK

Romans 3:1–20

We live in a world that downplays the consequences of sin even as it experiences them. War is imminent, depravity rampant, rape, abortion, abuse, personal hopelessness, suicide abound, and we could go on. We live in a fallen and broken world, and as heartbreaking as the above list is, it is worse than that. We are separated from the God of the Bible through our inability to keep His law. We are sinners who don't seek Him and because of that are under judgement. The law helps, but in this case, only to show us how sinful we actually are. No matter how hard we try, we can't be declared approved in His sight by human works.

The power of the Gospel is most beautifully displayed in the knowledge of the holiness of God and honesty of our own lost-ness. We have an *emergency*, and the only thing to do is to cry out to God and cling to the Savior, as we discover the *power of the Gospel!*

"For this reason I bow my knees before the Father, ¹⁵ from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named, ¹⁶ that according to the riches of his glory he may grant you to be strengthened with power through his Spirit in your inner being, ¹⁷ so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith—that you, being rooted and grounded in love, ¹⁸ may have strength to comprehend with all the saints what is the breadth and length and height and depth, ¹⁹ and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, that you may be filled with all the fullness of God.

²⁰ Now to him who is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think, according to the power at work within us, ²¹ to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, forever and ever. Amen."

Start your prayers by rejoicing in God being your Father. This is an amazing reality that Packer states, "You sum up the whole of New Testament religion if you describe it as the knowledge of God as one's holy Father. If you want to judge how well a person understands Christianity, find out how much he makes of the thought of being God's child, and having God as his Father. If this is not the thought that prompts and controls his worship and prayers and his whole outlook on life, it means that he does not understand Christianity very well at all." Rejoice in your sonship!





Only as we move forward in grace can we continue to move forward in joy. The closer we get to Him, the more we will realize how much we need His grace, and so we must live in that grace as we go hard after holiness!

My prayer is that as we reflect on these chapters of holy Scripture, we will discover together the richness of a community that makes it our aim to *please Him!*





ADDITIONAL ARTICLES

WHAT IS THE GOSPEL?

We often talk about being Gospel-centred or Gospel-focused. To understand how to build a culture that is honouring to God, it is essential that we understand, experience, and constantly bathe in the Gospel. To begin this growth in being a Gospel-centred culture, we must grasp what the Gospel is. There are many in our world who use the term but don't understand or experience the transformation.

The Gospel is literally "the good news," and it is good because it addresses the deepest and most desperate need that all humans have. The Bible is clear that getting the Gospel wrong is dangerous (Galatians 1:8-10) and leads to destruction. It is very sad that there are those who think they are saved but are not (Matthew 7:21-27) and those who are saved by grace through faith who are not living in the fullness of what experiencing the Gospel daily provides.

To experience this good news there are five realities that must be grasped, believed, and then lived in light of in daily experience.

1. God: A rich experience of the Gospel is God-centred and always includes a belief about who God is that matches how He has revealed Himself in His Word. There is only one true God, who is holy, and made us in His image to worship Him. His holiness refers to His separateness from His creation and His absolute purity.

2. Humans: All humans have sinned (Romans 3:23) and in this separated ourselves from God and placed us under His righteous wrath. The wages of sin is death (Romans 6:23), and the only way for sinners to pay for sin is to spend eternity separated from God in hell.

3. Jesus: God loved us so much that He, according to His eternal plan, sent Jesus, His only Son into the world. Jesus lived a perfect life thus fulfilling the law Himself in our place; He died on the cross in our place thus taking on Himself the sins of those who believe in Him. He rose again from the dead and in this conquered sin and death. He displayed that God accepted this sacrifice, and His wrath against sinners who believe in Jesus has been fully exhausted.

4. Humans: God now calls on humans, by grace through faith, to repent of their sins and trust in Jesus alone for forgiveness. This belief in Jesus alone is a faith that saves. When humans believe they are forgiven and reconciled to God, this new relationship becomes the centre of their lives.

5. Spirit-Filled Life: All who are saved by grace through faith are made new creations, and seek to live a life that is surrendered to the Lordship of Jesus and devoted to His glory. This pursuit of holiness is a progression that He helps believers to pursue. The Spirit-filled life will include a desire to never ignore so great a salvation.

Mark Dever summarizes it like this...

A good way to summarize this good news is to biblically unpack the words God, Man, Christ, Response.

1. God: God is the creator of all things (Gen. 1:1). He is perfectly holy, worthy of all worship, and will punish sin (1 John 1:5, Rev. 4:11, Rom. 2:5-8).

2. Man: All people, though created good, have become sinful by nature (Gen. 1:26-28, Ps. 51:5, Rom. 3:23). From birth, all people are alienated from God, hostile to God, and subject to the wrath of God (Eph. 2:1-3).

3. Christ: Jesus Christ, who is fully God and fully man, lived a sinless life, died on the cross to bear God's wrath in the place of all who would believe in him, and rose from the grave in order to give his people eternal life (John 1:1, 1 Tim. 2:5, Heb. 7:26, Rom. 3:21-26, 2 Cor. 5:21, 1 Cor. 15:20-22).

4. Response: God calls everyone everywhere to repent of their sins and trust in Christ in order to be saved (Mark 1:15, Acts 20:21, Rom. 10:9-10).

The Gospel is so simple that a child can understand it, and yet so profound, that it will be something those who know Jesus will spend eternity celebrating (Ephesians 2:7).

These realities of the Gospel are amazing and must be grasped, believed, and experienced to be saved and to live a victorious Christian life. It is not enough to know these, or even to believe them, they *must never be neglected* (Hebrews 2:3). The best way to "escape" this danger is to preach the Gospel to ourselves every day.

HOW TO PREACH THE GOSPEL TO YOURSELF EVERY DAY

Why is this important?

The simple answer is that the Gospel serves as the centre of a heart that is fully devoted to Jesus. It also helps us to obey Hebrews 2:3 and be those who do not ignore so great a salvation! The Gospel compels us to a life of full devotion to Jesus (2 Corinthians 5:14; Romans 12:1-2), and if we are having trouble in our spiritual life, it is always related foundationally to our experience of the Gospel.

Colossians 1:4-6 states, "Since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, ⁵ because of the hope laid up for you in heaven. Of this you have heard before in the word of the truth, the gospel, ⁶ which has come to you, as indeed in the whole world it is bearing fruit and increasing—as it also does among you, since the day you heard it and understood the grace of God in truth."

This passage shows that we begin in the Gospel, and then carry on, as its fruit is increasing in our lives! This is what we want: the Gospel experienced and increasing its power in bearing fruit in our lives! The Gospel not only introduces us to God, it produces the motives and freedoms that come from its work in our lives.

How do we remind ourselves of the Gospel every day so that it can be applied to every area of our thinking, believing, and living? Preaching the Gospel to yourself is a habit that, once formed, is a pattern of life. It is a reminder of what Jesus has done for you and what that means in terms of your identity with Him.

It is the discipline of actively calling to mind what Jesus has done for you and the wonderful results of this gift of salvation.

It is acknowledging the fullness of the Gospel and then reminding yourself of the implications. This can be done standing in front of a mirror and talking to yourself (perhaps when no one else is around), or in prayer, rejoicing in who God is and what He has done. It is also great as a weapon against condemnation and apathy, against pride and self-pity, and the list could go on.

This idea of *remembering* is all over the Bible (Deuteronomy 6:12) and something to apply whether through a mound of rocks over Achan, a mound of rocks in the river and on the shore, a tassel, a feast, or so many more. We are called to *never* forget certain things because those things shape everything else. They

help us think, they guard our hearts, (Proverbs 4:23), and when lived in light of, they glorify God!

When you are tempted to feel overwhelmed in guilt and shame at your sin, remind yourself that Jesus' life, death, and resurrection are what give you forgiveness and freedom. Memorize important Scriptures like Romans 8:1 or 1 John 1:9, and live in light of the reality of the Gospel.

If you are tempted to pride or self-pity, remind yourself of Ephesians 2:8-10, and rejoice in God's workmanship; He gets the glory, and you have immense value in Him. Boast in your weaknesses, and remember that God uses weak people (1 Corinthians 1:18-30; 2 Corinthians 12:9-10). If you lack passion and find yourself apathetic, meditate on the love of Jesus as seen in the cross, and you will find yourself compelled (2 Corinthians 5:14).

It is not a surprise that the ordinances God has given the church focus on this reality: remembering, fixing our eyes on Jesus, proclaiming His death until He returns, and rejoicing in our identity with Him. The Gospel must be central in our thoughts and lives if we are to live confident, obedient, joy-filled lives.

It is the discipline of actively calling to mind what Jesus has done for you and the wonderful results of this gift of salvation. We need memorials, no longer at Gilgal, but on our mirrors, in our cars, and on our knees.

When I am praying, I journal, and in this I seek to thank God early on for what He has done for me in the Gospel and plead with Him to deepen my experience of His love (Ephesians 3:14-21). Consciously place the beauty of your salvation before your eyes every day! *Never forget*...and it will change everything else about you!

PREACH THE GOSPEL TO YOURSELF EVERY DAY!

Simplify:

- Remember what God has done for you in the Gospel
- Reflect on these riches
- Repent of wrong thinking
- Rejoice in God's great love
- Renew your commitment to live for His glory with every breath

THE INCREASING FRUIT THAT COMES FROM REMEMBERING THE GOSPEL

What is the impact of having the Gospel at the foundation of a life? What is the fruit that will bear and grow if the Christian life is lived in the power of Gospel?

Colossians 1:4-6 states, "Since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, ⁵ because of the hope laid up for you in heaven. Of this you have heard before in the word of the truth, the gospel, ⁶ which has come to you, as indeed in the whole world it is bearing fruit and increasing—as it also does among you, since the day you heard it and understood the grace of God in truth."

We would argue that this Gospel life that is lived out will impact everything, but we want to focus on 6 areas of life that will be changed and changing if life is lived in the context of the Gospel.

If you find yourself struggling with sin or overwhelmed with life in a way that is depressing, the Gospel is the solution and help when remembered and experienced. One of the best ways to do this is to preach to ourselves as Psalm 42 and other places declare, to take the truth of the Gospel, and apply it to our lives so that everything else is changed.

For the Christian, this is the most important *keystone* habit. It will overflow and impact so many other things. The following are realities that when seen through the Gospel are path changers for the believer.

a) Freedom From Condemnation: Romans 8:1

Oh the joy of grasping this, especially when we see the seriousness of sin in our lives! The closer we get to God, the further away we realize we are and the more we need to experience His loving forgiveness!

One of the great crippling realities in the life of a Christian is when we realize how HOLY God really is and that even our good deeds are as filthy rags. When authentic believers come face to face with sin. In the context of the holiness of God, the precious reality of total cleansing is overwhelming.

We can be crippled by our guilt and sin if we do not orient our lives around the Gospel, if we do not grasp the beauty and freedom of what Jesus has done for us in our freedom from condemnation.

J.C. Ryle wrote, "the man whose soul is growing feels his own sinfulness and

unworthiness more every year...the nearer he draws to God, and the more he sees of God's holiness perfection, the more thoroughly is he sensible of his own countless imperfections."

So the more we grow in our relationship with God, the more we need the reality of the Gospel to remind us of our forgiveness! In Christ, we are free from condemnation!

b) Passion For Life For His Glory: 2 Corinthians 5:14

2 Corinthians 5:14 lets us know that when we understand and rejoice in the love of Jesus, it controls us! It is impossible to be apathetic when you experience the richness of the Gospel; it is a driver of passion.

The word for "controls" in 2 Corinthians 5:14 is a word that is forceful! It grabs, it presses, it does not ask for permission.

Kenneth Wuest paraphrases this verse like this, "The love which Christ has for me presses on me from all sides, holding me to one end and prohibiting me from considering any other, wrapping itself around me in tenderness, giving me an impelling motive."

One who grasps the richness of the Gospel cannot be apathetic. God's love, when experienced is a controlling love that drives the life of the one who has so experienced it. You can't remain the same if you understand what Jesus has done for you.

If you find yourself drifting into apathy or contentedness with sin, the answer is not only to fight sin and apathy but to fight it with a delight in the Gospel! In fact the Gospel is the place that will give an overwhelming passion to pursue Jesus and seek to live for Him.

Luke 7:36-50, "One of the Pharisees asked him to eat with him, and he went into the Pharisee's house and reclined at table. ³⁷ And behold, a woman of the city, who was a sinner, when she learned that he was reclining at table in the Pharisee's house, brought an alabaster flask of ointment, ³⁸ and standing behind him at his feet, weeping, she began to wet his feet with her tears and wiped them with the hair of her head and kissed his feet and anointed them with the ointment. ³⁹ Now when the Pharisee who had invited him saw this, he said to himself, "If this man were a prophet, he would have known who and what sort of woman this is who is touching him, for she is a sinner." ⁴⁰ And Jesus answering said to him, "Simon, I have something to say to you." And he answered, "Say it, Teacher."

⁴¹ "A certain moneylender had two debtors. One owed five hundred denarii, and the other fifty. ⁴² When they could not pay, he cancelled the debt of both. Now which of them will love him more?" ⁴³ Simon answered, "The one, I suppose, for whom he cancelled the larger debt." And he said to him, "You have judged rightly." ⁴⁴ Then turning toward the woman he said to Simon, "Do you see this woman? I entered your house; you gave me no water for my feet, but she has wet my feet with her tears and wiped them with her hair. ⁴⁵ You gave me no kiss, but from the time I came in she has not ceased to kiss my feet. ⁴⁶ You did not anoint my head with oil, but she has anointed my feet with ointment. ⁴⁷ Therefore I tell you, her sins, which are many, are forgiven—for she loved much. But he who is forgiven little, loves little." ⁴⁸ And he said to her, "Your sins are forgiven." ⁴⁹ Then those who were at table with him began to say among themselves, "Who is this, who even forgives sins?" ⁵⁰ And he said to the woman, "Your faith has saved you; go in peace."

If you feel so overwhelmed with your sin that you can't function, rejoice in Jesus becoming sin for you, and live free from condemnation! If you are not choosing obedience but struggling with sin your life, rejoice in Jesus' love for you, and experience it so richly that you can't help but obey!

The Gospel oriented life is free from condemnation, is passionate about pleasing Jesus, and next, it produces...

c) Sacrificial Love For One Another: EPHESIANS 5:1-2

This is so important for us to be loving to one another, for Jesus said it is the defining mark of His true followers (John 13:33-34). The only way to love like Jesus is to repeatedly experience the Gospel in fresh and deepening ways.

The only way we can become imitators of God as dearly loved children is to experience God's love, and then as an overflow of that experience, we love one another as we have been loved selflessly and filled with a willingness to pursue God's best for others.

Sadly, often the church is known for things other than love and the key reason for this is that we have lost sight of our experience of His love. Loving one another is not only not an optional command, it is an overflow of a Gospel-centred life. We must never forget the Gospel of Jesus; we must constantly call it to mind.

If you struggle loving those around you with the love of God, if you find yourself longing to be loved rather than loving, or gossiping and slandering rather than serving, begin with a long gaze at the love of Jesus, and bask in the Gospel.

You will never be the same!

d) Forgiving One Another: EPHESIANS 4:32

There are some things that are so difficult to forgive! In fact, from a worldly perspective, impossible. If you struggle forgiving others, the key issue is to meditate on the Gospel and your own forgiveness!

Jesus takes us there in Matthew 18...

"Then Peter came up and said to him, "Lord, how often will my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?" ²² Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy-seven times.

²³ "Therefore the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his servants. ²⁴ When he began to settle, one was brought to him who owed him ten thousand talents.²⁵ And since he could not pay, his master ordered him to be sold, with his wife and children and all that he had, and payment to be made. ²⁶ So the servant fell on his knees, imploring him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' ²⁷ And out of pity for him, the master of that servant released him and forgave him the debt.²⁸ But when that same servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii, and seizing him, he began to choke him, saying, 'Pay what you owe.' ²⁹ So his fellow servant fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' ³⁰ He refused and went and put him in prison until he should pay the debt. ³¹ When his fellow servants saw what had taken place, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their master all that had taken place. ³² Then his master summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. ³³ And should not you have had mercy on your fellow servant, as I had mercy on you?' ³⁴ And in anger his master delivered him to the jailers, until he should pay all his debt. ³⁵ So also my heavenly Father will do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother from your heart."

This is extremely strong in terms of what true forgiveness produces in those who have truly understood it! It is actually overwhelming in terms of the command and consequence of not forgiving others, but notice the process to a forgiving heart — it is knowing how much we have been forgiven and treating others how we are treated!

If you struggle with forgiving someone who has deeply offended you, hear the commands of God, but also experience His love and forgiveness afresh in the Gospel! If you feel like you can't forgive someone who has wronged you, bask

in the Gospel, and you won't be able to keep the forgiveness from flowing from your heart!

e) Knowing Your Identity In Christ: 2 CORINTHIANS 5:21

If you struggle with insecurity and feel overwhelmed at your own weakness, realize whose you are and who you are!

YOU ARE IN CHRIST!

This is who you are!

When God looks at you, He sees the righteousness of Jesus. He sees Jesus and His obedience that is given to you in Him. His power at work in your life. John 15 shows us how this is worked out in our connection to the *vine* and what this means for producing fruit. If we remain in Him, we will prove ourselves to be His by what our lives are showing and producing.

You need never feel overwhelmed with your circumstances or unable to accomplish what God has asked you to do! You are literally His "work of art" and He has created you in Christ Jesus (Ephesians 2:10), so you need never feel insecure or unable if you are in His will. Self-confidence is weak and frail and will never fully be satisfied by those who truly know themselves. Confidence in Christ will never fail for those who truly know Him and who they are in Him.

In fact Paul takes this to new heights when he boasts in his weaknesses so that the power of Christ may rest on him (2 Corinthians 12:10). It is all about whose you are, and in Him, who you are, not how you feel about yourself. I am His son, I am loved by Him, I am justified, I am a new creation, I am in *Him*! If you struggle with depression and defeat, with insecurity and anxiety, then meditate on the beauty of the Gospel and your identity through it in Jesus, and you will never be the same!

f) Humility: MATTHEW 5:3

God hates pride and self-centredness, and the cure for both is the Gospel!

Matthew 5:3 "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

God approves the humble. We find hope in our honest evaluation of ourselves, and in this hope we rejoice greatly as we see God at work in us and through us for His glory! Humility comes from the Gospel, our faith in it, and experience of it. When we see what we deserve, we will never look down on others. We will see them through Gospel eyes (2 Corinthians 5:16).

We will hate sin! In our hatred of sin, we will see ourselves as fellow beggars who long for those who are sinners to know Jesus and find forgiveness, freedom, and a new lease on pursuing holiness as God defines it! We will view others as opportunities to display the love of Jesus to rather than a more worldly self-centred sight.

g) Mission: 2 CORINTHIANS 5:11-21

The Gospel experienced is the greatest motive to live a life that shares this great news with others. The more we experience the Gospel the more it drives our prayers and our pursuit of others to know Jesus.

The better we understand the richness of what Jesus has done for us, the more our lives will display the beauty of who He is. We choose to live for Him and His glory, and in that we become those whom Christ makes His appeal through. If you struggle with choosing to share the Gospel with those around you, preach the Gospel to yourself and you will experience afresh a passion to reach out as an ambassador for the King of kings.

h) Hope: ROMANS 8:32

The more we think about the Gospel and settle in on the greatness of who God is and what He has done for us, the more we will experience the richness of life as planned by God.

HE IS FOR US!

In all of life, no matter what is going on in our own lives, HE IS FOR US! Oh that we would grasp this!

Romans 8:32 is now one of my favourite verses! "He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?"

The abundant Christian life comes from Gospel orientation! If you struggle with forgiveness, hear the commands of God, but also experience His love and forgiveness afresh in the Gospel! If you feel so overwhelmed with your sin that you can't function, rejoice in Jesus becoming sin for you, and live free from condemnation! If you are not choosing obedience but struggling with sin your

life, rejoice in Jesus' love for you, and experience it so richly that you can't help but obey!

Again, if you struggle loving those around you with the love of God, if you find yourself longing to be loved rather than loving, or gossiping and slandering rather than serving, begin with a long gaze at the love of Jesus, and bask in the Gospel. You will never be the same!

If you feel like you can't forgive someone who has wronged you, bask in the Gospel, and you won't be able to keep the forgiveness from flowing from your heart! If you find yourself insecure, anxious, or fearful, go back to the Gospel; stop there, stay there! If you have selfishness and pride and look down on others, or slander them, go back to the greatness of Grace!

If you lack hope, feel despair, and are in a situation that feels overwhelming, *go* back to the Gospel and stay there! Never forget...and you will forever be changed!

I AM NOT ASHAMED OF THE GOSPEL

What does it mean for us at Cloverdale Baptist Church to not be ashamed of the Gospel? This is an important question as it is the theme of the book of Romans, as Paul seeks to minister in a way that displays this lack of shame (Romans 1:16-17).

Perhaps an easier question to answer would be, what does it mean to be ashamed of the Gospel? It means that we try to hide who we are so as to avoid feeling embarrassed or awkward about Jesus and what His Word teaches.

So what does it mean to be unashamed of the Gospel? It means that we seek to show how great this Gospel is with our lives and with our lips. It means we grasp how great God is and that He has called us to a ministry of reconciliation, and so we live our lives as Ambassadors for Jesus.

To experience the Gospel is to boast in the cross (Galatians 6:14). To not be ashamed of the Gospel is to live in such a way that our lives and lips always point to Jesus. It is so much more than wearing a cross, or driving with a fish on our cars. It is seeing all of life as an opportunity to represent Jesus well.

To not be ashamed of the Gospel means that we will seek to live as faithful ambassadors, representing Him in every area of our lives all of the time. We will not only believe the Gospel, we will know it well enough that we will be actively looking for opportunities to share it. Life and lips (1 Peter 2:11-12) engaged for the glory of God (1 Corinthians 10:31).

ALL OF LIFE WILL BECOME AN OPPORTUNITY TO LOVE GOD AND LIVE IN OBEDIENCE TO HIS WORD.

If each of us is willing to be personally not ashamed of the Gospel we will be a people who together build a **culture of evangelism** in a place where we love God so much that the overflow of our hearts will be praying for, preparing for, and pushing for opportunities to share the Gospel.

Don't be ashamed of the Gospel. Join us in our pursuit of a culture of evangelism by choosing to live a life that is not ashamed of the **Gospel!** Actively look for appointments that God is giving you, and choose to be one who is sharing with life and lips the wonder of who God is and what He has done.

WHAT IS BIBLICAL WISDOM & HOW DO I GET IT?

I was recently at a prayer meeting where we were studying the attributes of God and using that as a trampoline to praise God and petition Him in the context of who He is. It was a wonderful study and closed with asking the question, how do we get biblical wisdom? I think this is so important for us as we seek to live our lives in a way that brings honour and glory to God. How do we make difficult choices in everyday life, so that who God is, is always on display in us and through us.

Lately it seems many Christians are making unwise decisions. Pastors, Christian leaders, and many others who call themselves Christians, statistically living like the world in moral failure (impacts every church), confusion and chaos that seems to be growing exponentially in the midst of a world gone mad. Followers of Jesus need wisdom like never before!

This should not surprise us, as the Bible declares that the pursuit of wisdom must be a high priority for followers of God. It is worth giving up everything we own to get it (Proverbs 8:11). It is better than gold (Proverbs 16:16) and as such should be something we treasure and pursue and seek to pass on to our children (entire book of Proverbs).

Author Haddon W. Robinson in his foreword to Robert L. Alden's book Proverbs: A Commentary on an Ancient Book of Timeless Advice states, "Men and women educated to earn a living often don't know anything about handling life itself. Alumni from noted universities have mastered information about a narrow slice of life but couldn't make it out of the first grade when it comes to living successfully with family and friends. Let's face it. Knowledge is not enough to meet life's problems. We need wisdom, the ability to handle life with skill" (p. 7).

My children have left, or are leaving high school. Lori and I long for them to get good educations, to have great jobs, to live lives that are successful, but significantly more important to us than these things is their pursuit of, and attainment of, godly wisdom. I am often asked by people how they could pray for me, and my number one request is for biblical wisdom. So often in life and ministry we are faced with decisions that are difficult and don't seem to have an easy win. We need wisdom!

In the Bible the concept of wisdom focuses on real life decisions. It is based on

knowledge and how that knowledge works itself out in a way that is the best way to live life in the presence of God and in a way that He would approve. Biblical wisdom is applied knowledge, and when it is active in people, they know what to choose, and choose it.

One person described it like this, "knowledge is knowing how to use a gun, and wisdom is knowing when to use it and when to keep it holstered." In the Biblical sense, it is knowing God's Word and how to live it out in the real world and help others do the same. It is a grasp of how best to live in the world but not be of the world in day to day decisions, big and small.

THE BIBLE PLACES A HUGE EMPHASIS ON WISDOM, AND HOW TO GET IT.

To keep this simple, we will ask the question, how do I get Biblical wisdom? As I teach our boys, and as I pursue this myself and seek it for our church, how do I become wise?

THE BIBLE GIVES A PATHWAY TO WISDOM, AND EVERY CHRISTIAN SHOULD SEEK TO BE ON IT!

1. Fear God: Proverbs 9:10; Psalm 111:10. This is where the Bible begins, and therefore as those who want to live their lives in a wise way, where we should start as well. To fear God means to know who He is as He has revealed Himself and to tremble in awe before Him. It means knowing how holy God is, how much He hates sin, and choosing to live life in a way that honours and pleases Him (Hebrews 12:14; 27-29). If you want Biblical wisdom, it is essential to be growing in your knowledge of God and who He has revealed Himself to be, and choose to fear Him (Proverbs 8:13). Biblical wisdom is always based in relationship, and this relationship with God must be based in a growing understanding and interaction with who He has revealed Himself to be. To be biblically wise, you must fear God.

2. Ask God: James 1:5 is simple and clear. If you lack wisdom, ask God and He will give it to you if you are fully devoted to Him and living in faith. Fearing God is foundational to asking God, so there is an order to this attainment of biblical wisdom. But here, simply put, "*If any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask God, who gives generously to all without reproach, and it will be given him.*" To be biblically wise, you must ask God.

3. Surrender To God: Romans 12:1-2 is a call to be living sacrifices in the context of the grace and mercy of God. It is full and absolute surrender to the one who died in our place. This is essential to healthy Christian living and key to attaining the ability to know what God's perfect will is. This will always be in the context of a knowledge of who God is and what God has done and is the pathway for every true believer. Putting God first in full surrender to the Lordship of Jesus is not only essential for being healthy as a Christian, it is another mark on the pathway to biblical wisdom. To be one who is following Jesus always includes a denial of self and a devotion to Jesus (Luke 9:23). Preferring one another shows that one has experienced the love of Jesus and is living in light of it (Romans 12:10; Ephesians 5:1-2). Proverbs 3:5-6 should not only be a favourite verse of those in God's family, it should be practically and actively lived out. To be biblically wise, you must be fully surrendered to Him.

4. Choose To Be Bible-Saturated: Romans 12:1-2 moves from full surrender to transforming one's mind. This is done through steady and passionate devotion-reading, studying, memorizing, and growing in God's Word. Psalm 1 marks the introduction to Psalms and successful Christian living and directs the one who wants to be honouring to God in all of life to meditate on His law day and night (Colossians 3:16-17). To be biblically wise, you must be Word-saturated.

5. Choose An Eternal Focus: Psalm 90:12 declares that if we learn to number our days, we will gain a heart of wisdom. When we realize how weak we are and how short our days are, we will learn to make the most of every opportunity (Ephesians 5:16) and in the grace of God, look for the good works He has prepared in advance for us to do (Ephesians 2:10). Wisdom comes from seeing reality from God's perspective and living life in light of the reality of eternity (2 Corinthians 4:16-18). To be biblically wise, you must live your life in light of eternity.

6. Counsel From Others: Proverbs 11:14. It is good to seek help from godly people who are wise, know us or the situation well, and can offer us what they believe to be God's wisdom. A person pursuing wisdom will always ask wise people for counsel (Proverbs 12:15; 13:10; 19:10; 24:6; 27:9) To live a biblically wise life, you must seek counsel from wise people.

Whether you are in grade 12, fourth year university, in your forties, or 112, you need to grow in Biblical wisdom, and treasure it as God's Word calls for in His people!

So often in our circles we have a growing knowledge of doctrine, and this is great...but needs to be matched with a growing wisdom. Choose to be on the

path of constantly growing in wisdom, and you will be one whom God declares when He sees you, "Well done My good and faithful servant."

We need wisdom as followers of God, or we will be swallowed in the chaos of the world and live in her likeness! Followers of Jesus need to choose to be those who are constantly growing in wisdom. On this path, each step matters and will lead to an increased speed and delight in learning how to live life for the glory of God. As God's children, we need to learn to handle life with skill, and He shows us the pathway to this treasure...walk it!

Proverbs 16:16 "How much better to get wisdom than gold! To get understanding is to be chosen rather than silver."

Questions for reflection: What is the difference between knowledge and understanding? Why do you think God values wisdom so much? Do you value wisdom as much as God does in how you are choosing to live your life? As you reflect on the five stones that make up the pathway to biblical wisdom, which ones do you need to focus on the most?

Don't forget, "your view of God is the most important thing about you," and live your life with wisdom for the glory of God.

ROMANS 1-3 ON DISPLAY IN CANADA

I love being Canadian and living in Canada. We live in a country that for a long time has truly been the *True North Strong and Free*. For much of my life-time, Judeo-Christian values, although not lived fully, have been assumed and protected.

Lately it seems we are moving rapidly away from this as a nation. The Romans 1-3 realities are more clearly seen today then yesterday in Canada and perhaps will be the reality we live in for many years. This is an opportunity to shine brightly for God in distinction from the world but also can be intimidating for those seeking to be loyal to God and his word.

SOGI is invading our school system and seeking to normalize, and perhaps even encourage, what throughout our history has been seen as worthy of being in the DSM and in the Bible described as sin. Our children are being taught that what the Bible shows as something that will separate people from Him (1 Corinthians 6:9-20) is not only okay but who they should respect and emulate.

The Supreme Court ruled on the Trinity Western Law School and has decided that freedom of religion is not as important as what is perceived by the Ontario court of appeal as, "deeply discriminatory to the LGBT community." Some have said that this will yield open access for LGBT students (this was never a part of Trinity's attempt to limit).Instead, it will mean that those who hold to what the Bible teaches about marriage and purity will not be able to train lawyers.

The government changed their rules around how employers can qualify for funding to hire students through the Canada Summer Jobs program. The idea was to ensure that any groups that are pro-life or believe what the Bible teaches about LGBTQ can't get funding. This means that those who affirm what God's Word teaches will not have access to government funding.

And this list of changes could continue and given their trajectory, will increase. So how do those who love God and want to obey His Word respond to what appears to be a rapid retreat from God's love, obedience to His Word, and attacks on Christian values?

Christians should be the best citizens any nation has, so we should actively pursue what we know to be God's best in the ways that good citizens do. We should vote, petition, educate, and pursue what we believe is best for our nation within the freedoms we have in Canada. This is good and right, *but* we are called to more as followers of Christ. How should fully devoted followers of Jesus respond in a way that is uniquely Christian?

Saddened: It is right to feel sad when people, who need to recognize what sin is so that they can join us in humility and repentance in faith in Jesus, are blinded by the world around them. It should break our hearts when authentic Christianity's influence is limited by law and, perhaps worse, when it is overtly attacked. Our hearts should break, not only for the general direction that our country is taking, but also for the hurt that this direction will cause to so many people who are encouraged to participate in sin and support it. We should mourn for those who are trapped in sin and for those who are trapping them. God's love should cause us, in humility as fellow sinners, to weep.

Surprised: That we have had it this good for this long. The Bible teaches that if we want to live for Jesus, the world will not be our friend. Canada has at least had a foundational morality that was very friendly to those who claim to follow God's Word. We should not be surprised that our world is moving in this direction, and we should understand from God's Word that we are to be found *in* the world but not *of* the world (John 17; James 4:4). We should not be surprised that the world is not the most comfortable place for true followers of Jesus (2 Timothy 3:12).

Shocked: That some who call themselves Christians are moving along the same path as the World and denying what God's Word so clearly teaches on purity and exclusive devotion to Him. There are churches who for the sake of a few dollars, or acceptance, or cultural adjustments for what they think is evange-lism are adjusting what the Bible clearly teaches. When the church becomes like the world to reach the world, the church reaches the world for the world. As Christians we must realize that we are different (1 Peter 2:11-12) and in this difference stand firm. We must be those who hear and obey the Bible and show in our speaking the truth in love who God is and what God wants (Ephesians 4:15-16).

Still: As we reflect on what is going on around us, we should always be doing this in a way that realizes that God is Sovereign and good and worthy of our trust ALWAYS (Psalm 46:10). Whether we are reflecting on Joseph (Genesis 50:20), Job (Job 1:21-22; 2:10), or Jesus (Acts 2:23; 4:28), we will see clearly that not only is God active in space time history, He is Sovereign over space time history. We can trust Him! No matter what is going on around us (Habakkuk 3:17-18;

Psalm 46:3), He is *still sovereign!* As those concerned about the direction of our nation, the first answer we should have is *trust & prayer* (1 Timothy 2:2).

Sacrificial service: Christians are often tagged with the judgmental label. Sadly those who name the name of Christ sometimes earn this. May we learn to weep with those who are struggling, and be willing to give ourselves to show people how great God and His Gospel are (Ephesians 5:1-2). We are to be known for our love (John 13:33-34), and although we live in a world filled with people who disagree with us, they need this love. We should ask ourselves in light of what Jesus has done for us (1 John 4:19), how we can be those who love those who disagree with His way (Romans 5:8). Our world is filled with broken people, and the farther away we get from God's Word, the more brokenness we will face. We want to be known as those who are loved by God, and overflow His love to others. We should do our very best as individuals to have an impact on our world as salt and light. In this, may we spend way more time looking for ways to self-sacrificially love those around us who are hurting and broken than in pursuing political change.

Stand steady: Christians are called to be followers of Christ. To obey His Word, no matter what the cost, is the mandate of those who call Jesus Lord (Matthew 7:21-27). If we are not doers of the Word, we are failing in our faith (James 1:22). We are to be those who are Word-saturated, and then follow Jesus as Lord by obeying His Word. On issues where culture is moving away from what God's Word teaches, we must *stand firm and let nothing move us*! Luther was correct when he said, "If I profess with the loudest voice and clearest exposition every portion of the truth of God except precisely that little point which the world and the devil are at that moment attacking, I am not confessing Christ, however boldly I may be professing Christ. Where the battle rages, there the loyalty of the soldier is proved, and to be steady on all the battlefield besides is mere flight and disgrace if he flinches at that point." (Quoted in Parker T. Williamson, Standing Firm: Reclaiming Christian Faith in Times of Controversy [Springfield, PA: PLC Publications, 1996], p. 5)

Marriage is sacred, and Trinity Western is right to declare, "sexual intimacy that violates the sacredness of marriage between a man and a woman" is something that should be abstained from!

Show: In a world moving rapidly away from Christ, the distinction of followers of Jesus should be, will be, more clear (1 Peter 2:11-12). This is an opportunity

for us to show people how great God is, to display the beauty of forgiveness, the power of love, the richness of what Jesus has done for people like us and can do for those we are showing His Gospel to. Jesus came to earth, lived a perfect life, and died in our place, so that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life. As those seeking to glorify God, our passion is to point people to Jesus (Matthew 11:11, 28:18-20), and this comes from humble hearts longing to show others the richness of forgiveness that we have experienced. Our mission is to make disciples, and to do this we want to be ready to give an answer to those who notice the hope we have in us (1 Peter 3:15).

We live in scary times, and yet maybe we are here for such a time as this (Esther 4:14). Actually, if we belong to Him, we are here for this time, and He has good works for us to walk in (Ephesians 2:10). Yes, the culture seems to be drifting, and sadly many in the church seem to be pulled along in the current. Yes the pace at which the culture is moving away from Christ seems to be increasing, and this can create discomfort in His followers.

So...

May our God find us faithful and on mission for Him in this country we call home. Oh that He would send a renewal to the church of first love devotion to Him, and as an overflow, we would see our reputation being one of Holiness and Love.

The further Canada drifts, the brighter authentic followers of Jesus will shine. May our God strengthen our resolve to live for His glory in love and loyalty to Him and His Word.
